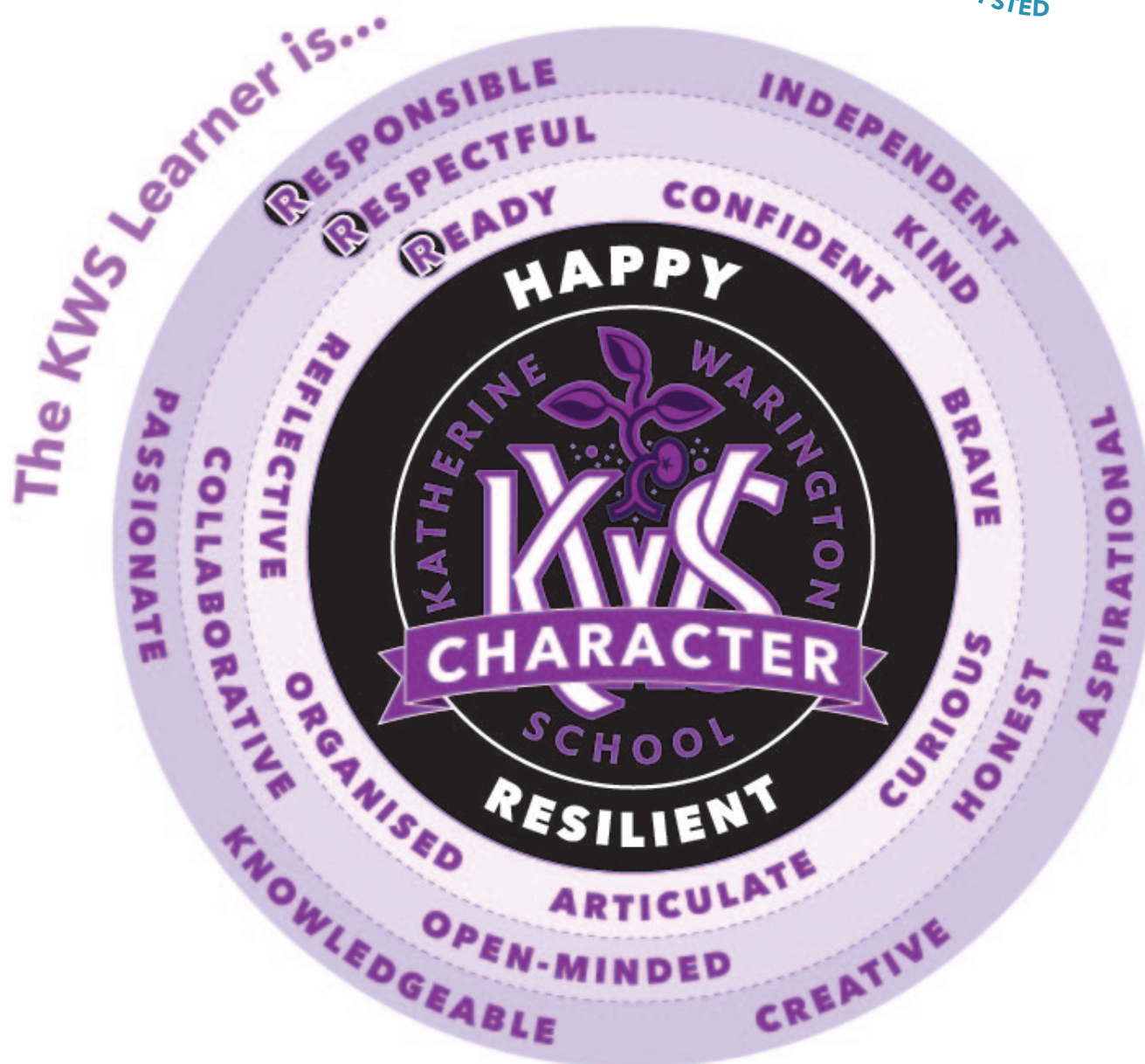

Literacy and Oracy

At KWS, we place a huge emphasis on literacy and oracy. Being able to read and write critically and speak confidently are crucial skills for academic success and for later life. KWS Library

At KWS, we are incredibly proud of our library and everything it makes possible.

More than just a collection of books, it is a hub of curiosity, creativity, and connection. The library offers a safe and welcoming space for all our students – a place to learn, to explore, and to be inspired. It plays a vital role in school life, supporting academic growth as well as wellbeing, and we are delighted that it continues to be such an important part of our community.

Alongside our print books and magazines, we have an extensive eBook and audio book collection as well as academic journals and online resources.

We have annual visits from authors and poets to bring the reading and writing experience alive for our students, and competitions to stretch and challenge.

There are leadership opportunities in the library for Student Library Assistants and Reading Ambassadors.

Some students also choose to complete the volunteering section of the Duke of Edinburgh's Award in the library too.

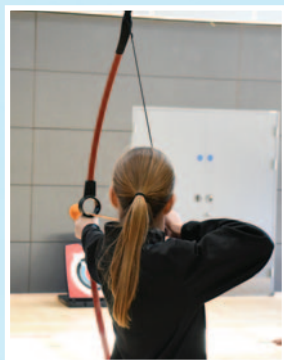

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A typical day

From Monday to Thursday school starts with 25 minutes of form time, within which students attend a year group assembly once a week. This is followed by two back to back 50 minute lessons, Periods 1 and 2.

After that there is a 20 minute morning break. Periods 3 and 4 then take place before lunchtime.

Lunch is 45 minutes long and year groups enter our food hall on rotation. We run a range of lunchtime clubs (as well as after school opportunities). Periods 5 and 6 follow after lunch, and then we end with Period 7 (see further details on page 9).

On a Friday we start the day with three lessons (periods 1 to 3), have a slightly later break from 11-11.20am and then Period 4 and 5. After lunch all students register in forms and then attend our Celebration Assembly in the Sports Hall, where we are able to highlight the many fantastic achievements of our students and showcase great work.

Transition into KWS

Starting secondary school is a unique experience for every child as they embark on the next chapter of their school career. Our transition programme supports each child to feel ready for all the new and exciting challenges that secondary school brings.

Summer School is held every summer as an additional opportunity for new Year 7 students to explore the KWS grounds, while acclimatising to the expected schedule of secondary school life and enjoying a variety of taster lessons in new subjects. It's an amazing opportunity to learn about wellbeing, school values, the house system, and everything else they need to be successful from their first day.

We recognise that the transition from primary to secondary is also a milestone moment for parents. We hold a new parents' event prior to transition day so you can ask any questions that have not been answered, and another in the first term to discuss how your child has settled in.



Chromebooks

All KWS students are encouraged to have and own a Chromebook for use during the school day and at home. Students will use Chromebooks as an educational resource to support their learning alongside traditional exercise books and resources.

Chromebooks offer:

- A suite of free Google applications (word processing, spreadsheets and presentations)
- Online organisation and admin including Gmail, Calendar, and ClassCharts.
- Collaboration - shared learning with Google Sites, Google Classroom (and all the above applications) e.g. creating mind maps.

- Online resources in class and at home - including the best and most up to date textbooks, eBooks, a range of educational apps and so much more.

Keeping safe online - we actively teach students how to be safe, responsible digital citizens through our Computing and PSHE curriculums. We also have a range of systems in place to ensure that students use their Chromebooks safely and responsibly, and offer support and guidance to parents to help keep children safe online.

Catering

We are proud to say our catering partner is HCL (Herts Catering Ltd) and our exciting all day food offer starts with breakfast through to mid-morning break and lunch time service. Students have a varied menu offer to ensure every child has access to nutritional meals that they truly enjoy. Menus are designed with guidance from expert nutritionists and alterations are made to meet dietary requirements.

The easy to use online cashless payment system is set up for parents or guardians to set daily spending limits, view purchases and sign up to low balance alerts.

Sustainability

At Katherine Warington School, we take our role as a leader in the community seriously and we are dedicated to championing sustainability and modelling good practice for future generations.

We completed the Green School Zero Carbon Project in 2025-2026 to recognise the work of our students in shaping sustainable ways of working. We have an established Eco/Sustainability committee who meet regularly including students, staff, trustees and parent volunteers.

We are delighted that our commitment to sustainable transport has been recognised at a national level and have been awarded the 'Excellent Travel Plan' award in 2025, the highest level of Modeshift recognition. We've also previously been awarded 'National STARS' Secondary School of the Year Award in 2021/22



and 2022/23. We promote sustainable travel and have extensive cycle parking for students and staff. We also run, in conjunction with Herts County Council (HCC), cycle training courses for students to ensure they are safe when cycling.

We have embraced the use of renewables and generate our own electricity through our solar panels, and have dedicated recycling points throughout the school building to ensure we waste as little as possible.

We also provide a uniform swap-shop to help recycle outgrown uniform and to help families manage the cost of uniform.

Our students explore a range of issues relating to the environment and sustainability, and many suggestions from our student council show our students' dedication to creating a sustainable future.

To advance our commitment to achieving Net Zero by 2030, our Premises Team operates under a strict 'Reuse, Repair, or Recycle' procurement framework. We prioritise extending the lifecycle of existing assets and sourcing circular alternatives before authorising any new purchases.

FAQs

How will I know how my child is doing and who should I speak to?

We appreciate that communicating with a secondary school may seem daunting. Through your child's time here at KWS, your main point of contact will be their form tutor and you are able to contact them through various channels at any point through the school day. Our pastoral teams work closely with our curriculum teams to ensure that communication is clear across the school and you will also have the ability to contact class teachers directly.

What is the school uniform policy and where can I buy my child's uniform?

For details of our uniform policy and our suppliers, please see the school website for the latest updates. Our uniform policy is updated yearly to reflect any changes to government legislation and we work with parents to ensure all students have everything they need to be ready for school.

Where can I find information about transport to and from school?

We work closely with Herts County Council to ensure that likely walking routes and cycling routes are safe, well lit and maintained. Similarly, we are engaged with the commercial bus companies which provide student transport to seek increases in capacity on those routes and identify potential additional routes that will be commercially viable for those companies. It is important to note that the school does not arrange or organise transport and that all decisions around transport are made by Herts County Council.

Information on the bus services currently serving the school is available on the school website.

Do students complete all of their work on their Chromebooks?

Students do not complete all of their work on Chromebooks but they are a crucial tool to help students succeed at KWS. They will be used in many lessons for a variety of reasons and help students to access a vast range of resources to complete their home learning. We ensure there is a balance and we have a strong focus on handwriting and presentation for all students through the use of traditional exercise books and paper-based resources.

Are students set in classes at KWS?

All KS3 classes are mixed attainment - there is no setting or streaming. We are an evidence informed school and the evidence points to sets not being beneficial. The EEF reports 'the impact of setting and streaming is 0 months progress'. Studies from the broader evidence base conclude that grouping pupils on the basis of attainment may have longer term negative effects on the attitudes and engagement of students.

Being labelled (top / bottom etc) leads to anxiety and issues ('I'm not good enough to be in top' or 'I am in the bottom why bother?'). Or complacency, ('I'm top, I don't need to work now').

Sets are based on a moment in time view; students ability in class and the work they can access and complete in reality changes based on many factors.

We do have some students working well below age related expectations in some of our year groups, and when needed, we add in a support class in Year 8 English and Maths.

How do you challenge high-achieving students?

Our teachers are experts in their field and work together to produce challenging schemes of work for learners at all levels. Teachers know their students and will provide bespoke stretch activities for all learners that require them. Our Academics Programme and huge range of enrichment opportunities also mean those students will have a continuous diet of challenging and rewarding opportunities.

How can I get involved at KWS?

We know that a successful school builds partnerships and trust with families/carers, and the school works continually with all families and members of the community to ensure all students achieve the best they possibly can. For those wishing to help at KWS, we always welcome volunteers to help with sports fixtures, period 7 sessions, performances, reading mentors and many other areas.

Our parent/school organisation, KWAf (Katherine Warrington Association of Friends), organise a range of events throughout the year and help the school to support local charities and in-school initiatives. They are always looking for new volunteers to help and ensure we have a range of direct links between our school and parents.

Our Name: Dr Katherine Warington

Katherine Warington was born in Harpenden on 5th September 1897. She and her identical twin sister Helen (Nell) were the youngest of five daughters of Robert and Helen Warington, who lived at High Bank, 14 Milton Road in Harpenden, a spacious property built for the family by Robert (they had three older sisters, Elizabeth, Margaret and Dorothy). Robert Warington was an agricultural chemist who worked at the Rothamsted Experimental Station alongside John Lawes. Katherine's mother died when she was about a year old and for a few years afterwards Katherine and Nell were brought up by their aunt Gertrude in Oxford. Eventually they returned to Harpenden, after their father had remarried.

Katherine was educated at a boarding school, St Mary and St Anne's in Abbots Bromley, Staffordshire. Her education was interrupted by the First World War, when she spent some time in Yeovil, Somerset working on the land, where she was accredited as a flax harvester. At a time when few women went to university, let alone became scientists, she then studied at Royal Holloway College in London and obtained an Honours degree in Biology in 1920. She worked as a volunteer at Rothamsted for a short while but by 1921 she had joined the Botany Department to work under Dr Winifred Brenchley D.Sc. Katherine continued with her studies and gained an M.Sc. from the University of London in 1922.

Katherine's initial research was into the micronutrients needed for the successful growth of broad beans by making them distasteful to blackfly. Through careful laboratory trials she showed that boron was essential for the growth of the beans and published her first, and seminal, paper, 'The effect of Boric Acid and Borax on the Broad Bean and certain other plants' in *The Annals of Botany* in 1923. She subsequently published further papers on a similar theme either on her own or with Winifred Brenchley. She was regarded as having demonstrated unequivocally the essential nature of boron and her work has been quoted in scientific papers relatively recently. From September 1928 to January 1929 Katherine was seconded to the Experimentalfaltet in Stockholm, Sweden, where she worked with Professor Lundegardh, another plant researcher. She very much enjoyed her time in Sweden and later named the house she built 'Visby' in memory of happy times visiting Visby in Gotland.

Katherine's fastidious and scrupulously careful research earned her a Doctorate of Science from London University in 1937. For example, she insisted that those who entered her glasshouse should always wash their hands first, to avoid contamination. She continued to investigate the role of other elements in

the growth of plants, assisting Winifred Brenchley with the Broadbalk study of weed growth in winter wheat and also looking at the growth of weeds in grass as part of the Park Grass Experiment, a

study began in 1856 and continues to this day. She concentrated on the weeds growing in the experimental wheat plots at Rothamsted, studying what affected their germination; for example, the effect of temperature, climate and different soils. She also experimented with seedling growth. Throughout her time at Rothamsted she exchanged information with other scientists around the world and spoke at scientific conferences in Britain and abroad.

Katherine never married (there was a severe shortage of young men after World War I), but she cultivated many other interests and enjoyed the company of her four nieces and eleven great-nieces and -nephews. Of course, she remained in close touch with her twin sister Nell, who became a physiotherapist and lived in St. Albans. She was a keen sportswoman, and in particular a tennis player; she won the Russell Cup at Rothamsted Tennis Club. She built her own house, Visby, at 15 Browning Road in Harpenden in 1935 and lived there until she moved to a retirement flat in Rothamsted Court in 1970. She enjoyed foreign travel and visited Denmark, Sweden, Switzerland, Latvia and Italy among other places. She had an enthusiasm for art and history and enjoyed visiting historic houses. Of course, she was a keen gardener and a great fan of the Chelsea Flower Show. She also took an active interest in politics, in particular events such as the General Strike in 1926 and, of course, the outbreaks and progress of both the world wars that she lived through. During World War II she opened her house to evacuees (a mother and child) and later received a commendation certificate from the Queen for this work.

Katherine retired in 1957, after which she volunteered at the Parish Office of St. Nicholas' church in Harpenden, where she had been a regular worshipper for many years. She is remembered as a modest, unassuming, quiet and retiring person, who was admired for her strength of character and fortitude in adversity. She died on 3rd July 1993, having moved to Sundridge House in St. Albans some years before, and is commemorated on her parents' gravestone in St. Nicholas' churchyard.

Katherine Warington would have been absolutely amazed to know that a school was to be named after her!





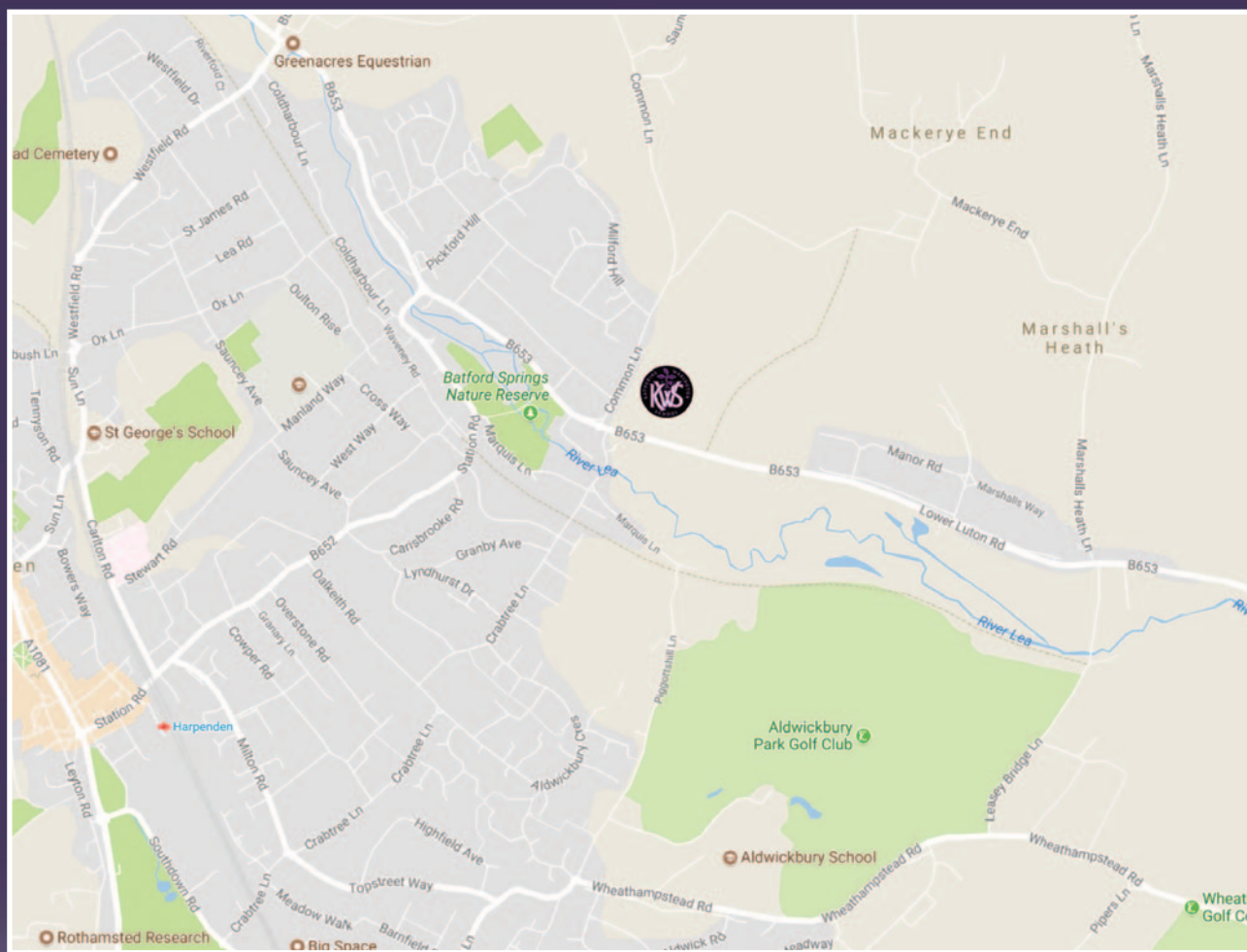
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
